

POVERTY STRATEGY FOR CLARE

10th December at 3:30pm: To mark International Human

Rights Day, author, academic and activist Dr Conor McCabe will present a discussion document outlining the initial stages of a research project he has been carrying out for Clare PPN. This project seeks to create a five-year anti-poverty strategy for Clare based on the lived experiences of people experiencing the various interlinked forms of poverty in the county. The project – the first of its kind – will run until May 2022 and is funded by the Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission under their Human Rights Grant Scheme. An open discussion on whether this framework is suitable to deliver sustainable rural and urban livelihoods in Clare will follow with input invited from those in attendance. 

Deadline 14th January: The Government has announced €60 million in funding for community climate action projects and capacity building over the next three years. The overall

Deadline 10th December: Some good transport news. The National Transport Authority is proposing an increase of approximately 25% in rural bus services as part of the five-

year Connecting Ireland plan that has just opened for public consultation. Under the plan, 70% of people in rural Ireland will have access to public transport service that provides at least three return trips daily to the nearby town (compared to the current 53%).
